A Guide to Planning Your Naming Day

A naming ceremony is a non-religious celebration of the arrival of a new child. It is a way of welcoming the child and officially introducing him/her to family and friends.

Naming ceremonies are appropriate for anyone, at any age. The arrival of a new baby, uniting of step or adopted children within a family, or an adult name change are all great reasons to hold a naming ceremony.

Naming ceremonies involve the important people in the child's life - family and special friends. Parents have the opportunity to ask other adults to play a supportive role to their child through to adult life (grandparents, godparents, mentors or supporters).

Poems, readings and quotes of personal significance can be used throughout the ceremony. The celebrant, family, friends or the parents themselves can do the readings. Often a symbolic gesture is also made such as the lighting of a candle, planting of a tree etc. In addition, certificates are presented to parents and other special people as a record of the occasion.

Naming ceremonies are not a baptism or christening. While the ceremonies are non-religious, many parents with religious beliefs hold naming ceremonies to welcome their child. Doing so does not prevent the child from holding or participating in a religious ceremony at any stage of their life.

While the Naming Ceremony and accompanying documents don't have any legal status, they are a wonderful way to welcome your child and celebrate them as they begin their journey through life.

Basically the baby naming ceremony format is as follows:-

I N T R O D U C T I O N

Celebrant welcomes everyone and touches on the sentiment of the celebration of this child.

A C K N O W L E D G E M E N T S

Special thanks and recognition to those who have come such a long way particularly those close to this child and family, also acknowledgement of siblings (this is a good idea so they don't feel left out)

BODY OF CEREMONY

How did this child come about; is there a special story.

Parents often have a speech prepared which explains their intentions for their Child's future

G O D P A R E N T S / G U A R D I A N S / M E N T O R S

Parents ask these special people/persons to accept the honour of playing an exceptionally important role in this child's life, to support the parents in their intentions and to take over at any necessary time.

S P E C I A L R I T U A L S

This can be a number of things for example drops of water on the child's head along with chosen words, candles can be used at this time, fragrant oils burning, each guest is given a small card, and they write a blessing and attach it to a tree which is planted. Really this is a time for parents to individualise their Child's ceremony.

T H E N A M I N G

The chosen names are given and the parents or whomever they chose can give an explanation along with it.

P O E M O R R E A D I N G

At any time a poem can be incorporated into the ceremony. This is a nice time for a poem or reading to be recited as it may relate to the child's names which he or she were just given.

C O N C L U S I O N

A few words by the celebrant to conclude the ceremony, signing and presenting the certificate.

My life and love will ripples make


And touch the lives of all

Here are some ideas to help you plan your special day.

Time capsule/treasure box - Can contain small gifts, photos, letters or written note cards. The capsule/box is presented to the child when they turn 18 or 21. Invite guests to bring an item instead of a present i.e. CDs; magazines; newspapers; the Guinness Book of Records; coin collections; symbols of something they wish for the child such as runes & crystals to symbolise different things like peace and hope; pebbles from someone's favourite beach 'that the child may always have a special place to go and think'; Celtic symbols such as a horseshoe for good luck; cuff links that he may be a gentleman; a joke book - that she/he may always keep her/his sense of humour; a pressed leaf that they may appreciate nature.

Photo board of baby photos of 'special people'.

Planting of a tree - Guests help plant the tree and as they place dirt into the ground, (Native Australian Plants are ideal and symbolic).

Lighting of a candle - Candles can be personalised and decorated with little flowers, butterflies, sporting items, cars, child's name, photo, date of birth, weight and length and a poem etc. The parents light the candles, make wishes for their child and promise that on each birthday when they light the candle on the cake they will remember what a miracle the child is.

Release a dove - the worldwide symbol for peace.

Wishing well/cards - Guests write their wish for the child on a note and place it in a wishing well for the parents to read and keep for the child.

Rose petal blessing - Shower with rose petals.

Write a poem about your child to read at the ceremony.
